July is National Minority Mental Health Month





COVID-19 Information and Resources

Tough Questions About Public Health

Following the FDA and CDC's decision to resume the use of the Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine, the Public Health Communication Collaborative (PHCC) has updated their [Tough Q&A](#) with messaging to help communicators address questions from their community. The “Tough Q&A” is a compilation of tough questions related to COVID-19, with suggested answers. Many of the topics listed are sensitive and often politicized. The document is designed to provide message guidance and framing for public health officials and others, and it is regularly updated to reflect new developments and emerging issues.

Study Says No Evidence That Vaccines are Unsafe During Pregnancy



In an early analysis of coronavirus vaccine safety data, researchers at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention **have found no evidence** that the Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna vaccines pose serious risks during pregnancy. The study included self-reported data on more than 35,000 people who received one of the vaccines during or shortly before pregnancy and is the largest yet on the safety of the coronavirus vaccines in pregnant people. 827 of those enrolled in the study completed their pregnancies, 86 percent of which resulted in a live birth. Rates of miscarriage, prematurity, low birth weight and birth defects were consistent with those reported in pregnant women before the pandemic, the researchers report.


Council on Education for Public Health Accreditation Orientation Workshop - Summer 2021
